




# ALL CHANGE



## AUSTRIAN MEDAL PARADE IN PARALIMNI



### Dear Santa,


From Cyprus to you is such a long distance, I hope this short note reaches you in time, for this Christmas I have a long list.

When everything is ready the family gathers around the tree and




sing Christmas carols. After the parcels and presents are opened all family members sit down to an enjoyable dinner which is usually fish or duck.

reading, and then set off towards OP 28.


With the finishing point in view the teams had to pass three more sections including grenade throwing, shooting and first aid.

The big event of the year for the UN Golf Society was staged at the Joint Services Golf Club, Dhekelia on Wednesday 16th November. The competition's main sponsor this year was Bell's Whisky (Wights Ltd - Nicosia), with the Armed Forces Financial Advisory Services (AFFAS), Pharos Travel and Phivos Motors (Nicosia) contributing other prizes.

As in previous years, the competition was played on 30 holes, following a par golf format where competitors equal or better a fixed score at each hole. This means that players are competing against the course and express their progress as being 'up' 'down' or 'all square'.

The original field of 42 entrants was dramatically cut by operational commitments only 24 hours before the start of play. Nevertheless, by 0630 hours 30 golfers gathered for breakfast at the clubhouse and the first 3-ball match teed off for their first 18 holes at 0706.

Weather conditions were overcast with the threat of rain. A blustery wind was always going to make playing conditions difficult. At lunchtime, at the end of the first round, three players (WO2 Donaghy, SSgt Hughes and CQMS Mullen) led the field at 1 down. Six other players were

## FAREWELL - SEE YOU SOON


