








# DEAR READERS!


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### Force Commander/Head of Mission's Message





The contribution made by UNTSO HQ, OGG HQ, OGG-T and OGL to the planning, manning and creation of Team Mountain will ensure that OGG-D will continue to play a positive role in assisting UNDOF to fulfil its mandate in the future.



# Casevac Exercise in Mount Hermon Complex Training until you cannot get it wrong

n Saturday morning, the 12th of November 2016 a Casualty Evacuation Exercise was conducted between OOG-D observers and Nepcon deployed in the Mt Hermon complex. The exercise scenario centered on the response to an injury sustained by an UNMO at a Temporary OP. The purpose of this exercise was to evaluate response times, reaction, drills, SOP's and contingencies to a situation which culminated in a casualty evacuation drill. On initiation of the exercise the Rapid Response Group (RRG)

and Medical team were activated simultaneously. Operational and situational briefings were issued to formulate and activate contingency plans that coordinated concurrent activity among those challenged with providing the required response at the right location on a timely manner. Within 15 minutes RRG and medical team reached the

casualty. An over watch was established by the security team before the medical team quickly set about assessing the casualty's Airway, Breathing and Circulation. Pressure dressings were applied on top of the primary dressing for bleeding control and a Combat Tourniquet was applied. Limbs were slightly elevated and the Cervical Spine and Lower limbs immobilized with

Cervical Collar and Splint respectively. Burn dressings were applied over the burn wounds and the administration of the required medical support continued which included setting up an intravenous (i/v) line and administering fluids to the casualty while also giving injections (Inj) of Morphine for pain relief and Ceftriaxone for infection prevention. The casualty's vital signs (Airway, Breathing, Circulation, including

Blood Pressure etc) were continuously monitored and assessed as the casualty was placed on a spinal stretcher, strapped in and then evacuated to Level 1 hospital in a Nepcon Position in Hermon Complex using a Light armored-Ambulance. While on route to the Level 1 the casualty was reassessed, reassured regularly and kept pain free while the tourniquet was released and tightened at regular intervals. Throughout this exercise a situation update was sent to Hermon Base position

the casualty was taken directly to surgical room and kept on monitors. There afterwards, normal care procedures continued with the casualty kept mildly sedated with Diazepam while the wound is examined thoroughly. While UNDOF have a Level 1 capability in the mission located in the Hermon Complex casualties can undergo evacuation to a Level 2 or a Level 3 care facility if required in the case of more serious situations. Mistakes cannot be made in providing medi-

# **Nepcon's In Theatre Training**

### Robust training for harsh conditions

ver the last several weeks the troops in Nepcon have been undergoing robust training in preparation for the harsh conditions in the peeks of the northern part of the Golan Heights.

dominant terrain within the Mountain Range and stands at an altitude of 2,814 m. It is the highest point permanently manned by the United Nations and is of strategic importance for the

The objective of this training was to ensure that troops, equipment and infrastructure within the Nepcon positions remain effective throughout the winter. Nepcon currently occupies five UNDOF positions on Mt Hermon in the Golan Heights. These positions are located in complex and challenging terrain where the altitude ranges from 1740 meters to 2814 meters. Mt Hermon is covered with snow from November to March. It is the most northern part of UNDOFs AOS and is located on the Lebanese-Syria border. UNDOFs Position called Hermon Hotel is located on the




Nepalese army only select the troops who are qualified in Mountain warfare for service with UNDOF. After the selection process the contingent troops receive induction training or mission mandate orientation training in BPOTC (Birendra Peace Operating Training Center). After deploying to the mission area Nepcon organizes Mission specific training for their troops to ensure that drills and skills are sharp and the peace



keeper is ready to respond to all scenarios. From the 18th of October to the 4th of November Nepcon conducted mountain warfare refresher intheatre training. This training was planned in two phases with instructor refresher training being completed in phase 1 and refresher training for 114 troops carried out in phase two. Special class and practical instruction was delivered which focused on patrolling, rock craft, rescue technique systems and medical evacuation. The Rock craft training included mountain terminology, knots, holds, belay and mountain theoretical knowledge while the rescue technique training featured free climbing, fix rope climbing, rope up climbing, repelling and other systems. Although the soldiers of Nepal have experience serving in severe winter conditions and high altitudes, the in-theatre training is vital to ensure that skills remain sharp, teamwork and group cohesion is developed and a disciplined approach to operations is maintained. This training has additional benefits that reinforces mental, physically and emotionally wellbeing and helps prepare the soldier to respond to many challenges in an effective manner.

# UNDOF RETURN'S TO CAMP FAOUAR

# Deploying to face the current situation

t 0920hrs on the 14th of November Fijibatt supported by personnel from Logbatt and the Nepalese Engineer Platoon moved in to occupy Camp Faouar on the Bravo side. This first phase of the occupation of Camp Faouar was the result of months of planning, briefings, meetings, preparation and coordination with various sections in UNDOF. In September 2014, due to the evolving Syrian conflict, UNDOF was required to move from Camp Faouar and implement its mandate from its base on the Alpha side. Since 2014 as the situation developed in the AO UNDOF has always been firmly focused in re-deploying back to the Bravo side once the situation presented itself. The sizeable detachment of troops from the 1st Battalion, Fiji Infantry Regiment which moved into Camp Faouar was commanded by Major Viliame Finemateaki, commonly referred to as Major Will. These troops departed Camp Ziouani on the 11th of November, bound for the Bravo Side, via Lebanon and included male and female Infantry Soldiers, a medical team, logistic support staff and Command team. The troops made a 40-hour administrative halt in UNIFIL Headquarters, Naqoura, Lebanon, prior to continuing on their move to the Bravo Side. This halt was utilized by the troops for additional training focusing on convoy and area

occupation drills. Another halt on the move was made at Yafour Hotel, in Al Sabourah, Damascus on Sunday evening, the 13th of November, where the final Tactical Convoy Orders, and Area Defence Orders were delivered. At 0730hrs on the following morning, the detachment made their final tactical road move to Camp Faouar using APCs, LAVs, and mobility support assets. At 0910hrs on the morning of the 14th of November, Camp Faouar was declared re-occupied and secured. An initial radio check was conducted with UNDOF JOC in Camp Ziouani, prior to the implementation of Camp occupation routine. Pre-determined defensive positions were manned, clearance patrols and the EOD team were dispatched and operations were quickly initiated. The Commanding Officer of Fiji Battalion, Lieutenant Colonel Daunivakasala Ravunakana, the Regimental Sergeant Major, WO1 Aminiasi Lepolo, and the Fiji Battalion chaplain, Rev'd

Captain Savenaca Nakeke also accompanied the main body of troops as they executed the first phase of the Mission's return to the Bravo side. Later in the afternoon at 1345hrs a flag raising ceremony to mark the occasion was conducted in the presence of the Force Commander and Head of Mission, Major General Jai Shanker Menon. The Syrian Senior Arab Delegate, General Younis, Chief of Mission Support, Mr. Bernard Lee, the Commanding Officer of Fijibatt, the Nepalese detachments in Camp Faouar and other notable figures in UNDOF Headquarters also attended this significant ceremonial event.

The Force Commander and Head of Mission addressed the troops on parade, thanking all the staff and personnel involved in such a huge achievement which is a milestone in the history of UNDOF. Maj Gen Menon reminded the troops of the importance of being vigilant in their tasks, and re-emphasized the significance of the mission's role in the region. On completion of the flag raising ceremony the contingent leadership, SSAD representation and international UNDOF staff departed for Damascus, entrusting the security of Camp Faouar to its new occupants. As time progresses so too does Camp development. The Fijian troops supported by UNDOF Hq staff, Logbatt and the Nepalese Engineer Platoon continue to enhance the infrastructure and facilities in the Camp to ensure that UNDOF are ready to continue its phased re-deployment back to the Bravo side.

# Fire Safety Week

### Awareness, Pevention & Response

n the 21st of November Logbatt initiated its Fire Safety Week in Camp Ziouani. The objective of this training was to ensure that all personnel

developed and enhanced their fire safety awareness, hone reactions, further develop responses and help coordinate the functions of other assets in the Mission. Greater fire safety awareness is of particular importance during the winter period when electric and gas heaters are continuously used to maintain room temperature during the harsh Golan winter. The fire safety week helped to refresh personnel in identifying fire hazards that potentially pose a risk to

life. This awareness helps to prevent a fire incident. Preventing injury or loss by fire is the responsibility of all personnel working in UN establishments. To assist in saving lives and property, a number of duty personnel are tasked to provide emergency response if required. During the week troops and staff were put through their paces in developing effective reaction to a fire emergency. The fire crew in Logbatt plays an important role in the primary response for all emergencies. However, emergency responses in Logbatt is a multi-agency effort as emergencies come in many forms that may require many personnel from different Units or Cells to act as emergency responders. This training week helped to coordinate the functions of many personnel within the Force which helped further enhance the emergency firefighting response system with other various agencies in the mission. Throughout the week personnel were informed of the basics which included checking on the serviceability and maintenance of equipment. They were also exercised in the use of the various emergency equipment available in UNDOF. The week culminated in a rescue exercise and a firefighting capability display which was followed by the award of the fire training certificate to those who met the required proficiency standards.

# The FRC's In-Theatre Training

### Training to produce the best outcome

The fluid nature of the situation in the Golan Heights requires UNDOF to maintain a Force Reserve Company (FRC) that is highly responsive and deployable within minutes to implement any of the Forces many contingencies. The 54th Infantry Group arrived in the Golan Heights in late September 2016 to take up the role of FRC. As a critical force enabler for the Mission the Unit has been undergoing intensive training as it constantly strives for perfection in drills to ensure that the Force's contingencies can be implemented effectively and efficiently. This progressive programme of training will help to ensure that the force is always prepared to meet unexpected challenges in UNDOF's area of operations.

The FRC are highly equipped with modern military equipment and are deployable using MOWAG APC's and CRV's while they also possess a MOWAG Armoured Ambulance that helps provide a medical evacuation capability. Troops in the FRC are drawn from infantry, cavalry, artillery, CIS, and medical Units which provides a highly skilled team with the capability and versatility to respond to all situations. The in-theatre training programme also involves the QRF (Quick Reaction Force provided by the FRC) conducting rehearsals with other elements and Nationalities within UNDOF.

This approach helps foster strong professional bonds built on knowledge and understanding that support reasonable expectations and help enhance interoperability between contingents. These rehearsals focus on many different scenarios including medical emergencies, compromised positions and extractions. The initial focus for the QRF was to become familiar with routes

to and from all UN locations in the AOR of the 54th Infantry Group. As rehearsals of the contingency plans improved, more of an emphasis was placed on a rapid but safe deployment to all UN locations during numerous scenarios by day and night. The implementation of realistic, kinetic and non-kinetic scenarios challenge the soldiers within the QRF to complete their individual skills and drills effectively whilst also challenging the commanders on the ground to perform to the highest of standards. The inclusion of the UN Observers within this training is essential for the success of these contingency plans adding realism and cross learning between elements and contingents within the mission. When not undertaking operations the FRC will continue its focus on the in-theatre training to produce the best outcomes.

# **Engineer Patrol Search Training**

reedom of Movement is critical to a UN mission. In UNDOF's Area of Operations there are locations that may be contaminated with mines, IEDs and ERW (Explosive Remnants of War). Training for the Patrol Search teams have continued after their deployment to UNDOF. The role of the Patrol Search Teams is to confirm the absence of these threats from patrol routes ensuring the freedom of movement for the Irish Force Reserve Company. If something suspicious is found or suspected the troops can call on the Engineer Specialist Search and Clearance (ESSC) and Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) teams to locate and make safe the device. All troops in the FRC are given training and instruction during their Pre-deployment training in the School of Military Engineering. Personnel were taught how to use their two most valuable assets, the Vallon metal detector and their own ground sign awareness. The soldiers conducted their validation exercise in early October prior to their UNDOF deployment. During this exercise troops were subjected to realistic scenarios under the watchful eye of trained instructors. These scenarios test personnel on their ability to detect mines, IEDs and ERW. The validation exercise helped assess the skill level of troops and determine their suitability for deployment to UNDOF. This acts as a quality control mechanism within the Irish Defence Forces prior to overseas service ensuring each member is an important asset in the FRC. However the approach to skill development in the FRC is: 'that if you do not use it - you loose it'.

Therefore the value of In-Theatre training under local environmental conditions cannot be overestimated. It helps develop greater understanding between contingents and nationalities enhancing interoperability. This In-Theatre Training helps create a better understanding of the challenges presented by the different terrain, weather and the tactics and techniques used by armed elements in the Mission Area. An enhanced understanding and boosted knowledge helps develop

# **Medical Approach to Maintaining Effective**

The FRC's medical approach to maintaining effectivity on an overseas mission comprise two diametrically opposite areas. The main focus is the lifesaving interventions that first responders use to initially treat military casualties. Since arriving in the Golan Heights training sessions have focused on the primary survey, and initial management of cata-

strophic bleeding, airway compromise, spinal precautions, breathing difficulty circulatory and problems. Intercontingent mass casualty exercises challenges troops to put these skills into practice. Intheatre training also

includes lectures on hand hygiene, climatic illness and first aid for snake and scorpion bites. The impact of this training on the overall health of the group shouldn't be underestimated, as an outbreak of flu or food poisoning is just as detrimental to the FRC's operational effectivity. The other end of the spectrum is the preventative medical and general healthcare practices that safeguard the health and wellbeing of all personnel. The preventative practices commenced long before deployment and include medical screening, dental screening and vaccinations.

### sessing the Skills to Respond

n the 23rd of October an 8 year old girl got into severe difficulty when she was visiting Mount Bental with her family. She suffered a partially severed finger when her hand became caught in an old military installation which is widely visited by tourists. Irish troops serving with the FRC in Camp

Ziouani just a few Kilometres away happened on the scene and immediately rendered emergency first aid. Under the leadership of Cpl Cox the Irish troops quickly applied their medical training to deliver the necessary first aid and then located the severed part of the girls' finger so that it could be preserved and surgically reattached later. Immediately after the girl was rushed to hospital, her family expressed gratitude and appreciation for the support of Cpl Cox's team who utilised their medical first aid skills which have been developed at an early stage of their Military Service. All troops in the Irish Defence Forces undergo a

Military First Responder Course shortly after their recruit training or induction phase into the Irish Defence Forces. Many soldiers undergo refresher training prior to serving overseas, an approach which helps to ensure that Irish Troops are versatile and possess the skills to respond to many situations.


### The Mission's Outreach

Holiday in Jordan.



### 06 January 2017 - Armenian Orthodox Christmas Day in Lebanon

Armenian Christmas is a culmination of celebrations of events related to the birth and baptism of Christ. In Lebanon, Christmas is celebrated twice; first on the 25th of December and then as a holiday on the 6th of January for the Armenian Lebanese community who celebrate Christmas on the same date as Epiphany. The reason for the different date is that until the fourth century, Christ's birth was celebrated by the Christian church

on the 6th of January. As Christianity expanded into Western Europe, the people there had been celebrating



a Roman holiday ('Solis Invicti') on the 25th of December. Rather than compete with an already popular holiday, the church simply decided to move Christmas Day to the 25th of December and celebrate the 6th of January as the Feast of the Epiphany. Undoubtedly, Solis Invicti itself was a holiday created to overwrite previous Pagan winter solstice celebrations. In Armenia however, there was no such solstice tradition and Armenian Christians didn't feel bound to move their Christmas from the 6th of January. A ceremony called "Blessing of Water" is conducted in the Armenian Church to commemorate Christ's Baptism. In some parts of the world, the 6th of January is sometimes referred to as 'Old Christmas' or 'Little Christmas', recalling the old date that the Armenian Christians still observe.

### 07 January 2017 - Coptic Chistmas Day in Egypt

In 1582 Pope Gregory XII as head of the Catholic Church decided to change from the Julian Calendar to the Gregorian Calendar. Other countries not under the Catholic rule retained the old calendar which had Jesus's birth on the 7th of January. Therefore Coptic Christmas Day in Egypt celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ on the 7th of January according to the Orthodox Church. Since it is a national holiday most citizens in Egypt get the day off to enjoy in with family and friends.







# pcoming Regional Events

25 January 2017 - Revolution Day in Egypt



Egypt celebrates two (2) revolution days each year both of which are marked by National Holidays. Revolution Day on the 25th Jan in Egypt marks the Egyptian Revolution which started on the 25th of January 2011. This popular uprising was against high unemployment and low wages. Protestors held demonstrations all around the country and on the 11th of February President Mubarak resigned.

### 09 February 2017 - Saint Maroun's Day in Lebanon

The 9th of February is St. Maroun's Day in Lebanon and is celebrated by a public holiday in the country. Saint Maroun (also Maro or Maron) was a priest and Syrian hermit and is the patron saint of Lebanon. He died in 410 AD. His life and miracles attracted many followers that became known as the Maronite movement. Maronite's make up 22% of the Lebanese population while there are approximately 11,000 living in Israel (mainly in Northern Israel) and up to 51,000 Maronite's in Syria mainly in the archdioceses of Aleppo, Damascus and Latakia.



### 14 February 2017 - Rafik Hariri Memorial Day in Lebanon



On the 14th of February the Lebanese observe Rafik Hariri Memorial Day which is a Public Holiday in Lebanon. This day of remembrance is dedicated to the former Prime Minister of Lebanon who was born on the 1st of November 1944 and was assassinated on the 14th of February 2005. In the 1970s, he started a construction business and became a multi-billionaire. In the early 1980s he began his political career in Lebanon making a significant contribution to the 1989 Taif Agreement that ended the Lebanese civil war. Hariri served as the Lebanese prime minister from 1992 to 1998 and again from 2000 to 2004. As Prime Minister he played an important role in the country's recovery from the war. He resigned from office during the political crisis caused by the extension of the presidential term. On the 14th of February 2005 Rafic Hariri was killed in a terrorist attack when explosives were detonated as his motorcade drove through Beirut. 22 people also died in the bombing.

### 08 March 2017 - Revolution Day in Syria

Syria Revolution Day is a national celebration of the military coup that occurred on the 8th of March 1963. Syria gained independence from French rule in April 1946. However, Syria's independence, was marred with political instability with various military coups against the ruling government. The Syrian Revolution occurred on the 8th of March 1963 when armies of National Council of the Revolutionary Command (NCRC) launched a coup to overthrow the government of Syria. The successful coup made by the Baath party (Arab Socialist Resurrection Party) is marked as one of Syria's most important public holidays which is celebrated annually



every 8th of March. The Syrian government celebrates the anniversary of Revolution Day by holding parades and delivering speeches, while government offices are closed and citizens spend time with family.



# Upcoming Regional

### 12 March 2017 - Purim (Tel Aviv) in Israel

Purim is a Jewish observance on the 14th day of the month of Adar in the Jewish calendar, which is in February or March in the Gregorian calendar. It commemorates a time when Jewish people were saved from death in the Persian Empire around the fourth century BCE. The Book of Esther, or the Megilla, is a book of the Old Testament that tells the story of Esther, a Jewish Queen of Persia who was married to the king of Persia. Around the year 357 BCE, the prime minister of Persia, Haman, and his wife plotted to kill all Jewish people in the Persian Empire.



Esther heard of this plan and warned the king, risking her own safety. Haman and his sons were executed and the Jews were ordered to defend themselves against those who threatened them. This resulted in bloody battles, in which many people were killed. Purim celebrates the end of these battles. Purim is a Public Holiday in Israel and is celebrated by many Jews. It is commemorated by listening to a public reading, often in a synagogue of the Book of Esther, sending a gift of food to at least one friend, giving charity to the poor and eating a festive meal.

### 13 March 2017 - Shushan Purim (Jerusalem) in Israel

Shushan Purim is the same as Purim but it relates to the celebration in Jerusalem and the walled cities. It is regarded as a National holiday in Israel. Purim in the Hebrew calendar falls on the 14th day of Adar every year but the date is different each year for the Gregorian calendar. Celebrations are very similar as Purim however some areas will celebrate with carnivals that involve costumes and festive games.
